The Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021: Statutory Guidance for Community and Town Councils (Section 2.14) sets out guidance regarding the Welsh Language. Community Councils are not subject to the Welsh language standards deriving from the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011, but ‘they are expected to uphold the main principle of the Measure and treat the Welsh language no less favourably than English’

**During our meetings:**

- Should a bilingual community Councillor wish to speak in Welsh that they are welcome to do so, however we request that they follow this up with the comment translated into English for those who do not understand Welsh.
- Should a member of the public attend a community council meeting, we request that they do the same should they be able to speak English as well as Welsh, or alternatively one of the bilingual members of the community council (if available on the evening) shall translate using best endeavours on their behalf.

**Llanbadoc Community Council will:**

1. Consider what we can reasonably do to promote the use of the Welsh language in its activities.
2. Improve website and information accessibility by including a Welsh translation function for those that would benefit from it.
3. Evaluate the success of the policy annually and consider whether the adopted Welsh policy needs updating.
